


LA VIA DOLOROSA

The First Station




It is since the 16th century that the first Station of the Way of the Cross in Jerusalem is situated at this site where the Antonia Fortress stood.


The Ecce Homo Arch

Moving from the Second to the Third Station you pass under the "Ecce Homo" Arch.



Stations.




A view of the Chapel at the Fifth Station All the Synoptic Gospels mention this event.

in Jerusalem




Inside the Seventh Station

The Franciscans took possession of this chapel in 1875 and they built over it two superimposed chapels. Within the chapel are the remains of a large column of red stone coming from the remains

of the Tetrapylon of Aelia Capitolina.



A carved cross marks the spot of the Eighth **Station** After the suk of Khan es-Zeit, Via Dolorosa proceed upwards for about 20 metres. A stone embedded in the wall of the Greek Monastery of Saint . Haralambos has a Latin cross and the Greek words "Jesus-Christ conquers".

the courtyard



A view of the Frankish Chapel


The spur of Calvary today lies within the Church of the Holy Sepulchre. When you enter the main door of the church a stairway on your right takes you to the spot where Jesus faced the death sentence. A great part of the platform of Calvary rests on an

infrastructure.




The altar of the Nailing to the Cross
